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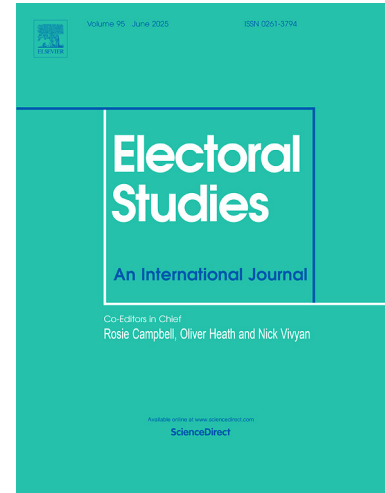

Professor Thomas Prosser is a political economist at the Cardiff University. His work interrogates European social democracy, social policy and party support bases using both qualitative and quantitative methods. His third monograph will be published by Bristol University Press in 2026, examining the rise of social justice ideology and highlighting its distinctiveness.

Professor Helen Berry is Deputy Pro-Vice Chancellor in the Faculty of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences at the University of Exeter. She is expert in British History and her research has explored the rise of the mass media and socio-cultural impact of 'fake news' before modern times. In 2020, in the wake of the Black Lives Matter movement, she chaired the Vice Chancellor's committee on the legacy of Lord Armstrong, an arms dealer and benefactor of Newcastle University.

Dr Eve Worth is a social and women's historian of Britain since 1945, Lecturer of Modern British History at the University of Exeter and member of the DWP Methods Advisory Group. Her interdisciplinary and mixed-methods research centres the experiences of women to advance understandings of social mobility and structural inequalities.
